HOW DO I MAKE AN APPOINTMENT?

STEP 1: MAKE AN ACCOUNT

Make an account at https://uncc.mywconline.com/ using your @uncc.edu or @charlotte.edu email address.

STEP 2: BROWSE AVAILABLE TUTORS

Hover over the names of available tutors to read their bios and conferencing options. The UNC Charlotte Writing Resources Center offers tutors who specialize in a variety of disciplines. There is always someone who can help!

STEP 3: PICK AN APPOINTMENT TIME

Choose from a variety of appointment times on the grid and fill out the intake form. The UNC Charlotte Writing Resources Center offers both day and nighttime hours to accomodate all schedules, as well as several conferencing options. These options include **in-person**, **zoom**, and **eTutoring**.

MORE ON CONFERENCING OPTIONS

IN-PERSON CONSULTATIONS

You can meet with tutors face-to-face in **Cameron 125** and **Atkins G34**. Bring a copy of your paper and the description of its associated assignment for the tutor to review. You will be able to discuss the strengths of your paper, generate ideas, and locate areas for clarification and/or improvement in your writing.

ZOOM

Zoom appointments are digital versions of face-to-face appointments through synchronous video chat. If you choose a Zoom appointment, you will need to visit the **WRC Zoom Room** at **https://uncc.zoom.us/my/wrchelp** at the time of your appointment. Make sure to be online with video and audio available at that time.



eTUTORING

eTutoring appointments are asynchronous. You can **upload your paper to your appointment intake form**. During the hour of your appointment, a tutor will offer marginal comments on your paper. Then, at the conclusion of your hour, watch your email for a notification that your appointment has been modified or that a tutor has responded to your paper. You will then be able to download a version of your paper with the tutor's marginal comments.

*eTutoring is an appropriate option when a piece of writing is in the final stages of the writing process and a full draft is complete. Comments are made through Microsoft Word.

WHAT CAN TUTORS DO?

WRC MISSION STATEMENT

The Writing Resources Center (WRC) offers one-to-one writing support for writers in any discipline and of all skill levels. Our highly trained writing consultants provide resources and tools Niners need to confidently develop their writing voice. The WRC celebrates the linguistic diversity of our students, faculty, and staff. We acknowledge that Standard American English (SAE) is only one way to speak and write. Our consultants help writers navigate SAE in their academic and professional writing, while also supporting writers' own languages, dialects, style, and voice. We strive to make the WRC a welcoming community for writers to practice new skills, talk through writing problems, make mistakes, collaborate with peers, and gain confidence in their writing abilities. Our space and our tutoring methods are inclusive to diverse identities (race, ethnicity, gender, sexuality, neurodiversity, ability, language, discipline, nationality, age).

LIMITATIONS ON APPOINTMENTS

- Walk-ins must register at **uncc.mywconline.com** and schedule an appointment.
- Clients may walk-in until 35 minutes past the hour. After that, they must wait until the next hour to try again.
- A client is limited to one appointment per day. This includes scheduled appointments and walk-ins.
- A client may schedule a maximum of three appointments per week, which applies collectively to all WRC locations.
- A client who has scheduled three appointments in a week may walk-in for one additional walk-in appointment.
- Due to high demand, a client may not book more than 2 sessions per week with Chris, the WRC's Senior Tutor. Clients may book an additional appointment with any other tutor.
- A client who has missed an appointment earlier in the day may not schedule another one later the same day. However, they may walk-in for a same-day appointment.
- A client who has recorded two no-shows receives walk-in only status for the remainder of the semester.

Born and raised in Rock Hill, South Carolina, Dr. Garahan wanted to be a teacher from the jump.

"The first day I stepped into the classroom when I was student-teaching... well, maybe not the first day, but really soon I was like 'Oh, this is who I am!"

The tutors in the WRC know Dr. Garahan as a supportive, driven, and caring leader and teacher. Her passion for the work is evident; this isn't just another job, it's her dream job! When asked about her favorite part of directing the WRC, she says, "Definitely mentoring the tutors. I love when tutors come into my office like 'hey, can we talk about this session?' Absolutely! It feels like a true community of practice."

Her personal philosophy on writing is right in line with UNC Charlotte's: "It's writing as a process and not a product." Dr. Garahan explains, "Ultimately, I want clients to walk away [from their tutoring sessions] feeling more confident in themselves. I want them to know that they already possess the skills to do this work, and they might just need someone to guide them."

Dr. Garahan earned her PhD from Virginia Tech and directed the writing center at nearby Radford for years. She loves the scenic Virginia mountains, but always had one eye on coming home to Charlotte: "I always thought if I could be the writing center director at UNC Charlotte, that would be the ideal job. So, to actually get to do it is surreal."

We're so grateful to have Dr. Garahan as our director and her door is (almost) always open!

"I've been here since about 2003. I was the first-year writing director for six years, then I got out of administration and was the undergraduate coordinator, and then I got back into teaching full-time. When [the WRC Associate Director] position came open, I thought it would be fun!"

Dr. Rieman wants to run a writing center that puts students in the spotlight, whether that means empowering tutors to take ownership of their work, or encouraging writers to be vulnerable and grow into their voice.

"The whole message is that you can write, you can learn to be a better writer. [Tutoring] isn't just for a one-off paper, we want to empower you to be a flexible and adaptive writer in any situation. You can do this work."





Tutor anna's HEARTY ETHIOPEAN STEW

An inexpensive and quick vegan recipe for the cold Winter to come!

INGREDIENTS

- Red lentils
- Vegan niter kibbeh
- Red onions
- Garlic ginger paste
- Tomatoes
- Ground coriander
- Ground cumin
- Berbere spice blend

PREPARATION

- 1. Add diced onions to a deep pan over medium heat.
- 2. Add a bit of salt and sauté until the onions start to brown.
- 3. Stir in a tablespoon of the vegan niter kibbeh and a tablespoon of the garlic ginger paste.
- 4. Mix in the tomatoes and cook until the tomatoes turn soft and pulpy.
- 5. Stir in the ground cumin, coriander, and berbere spice blend. Let cook for two minutes.
- 6. Stir in lentils and two cups of either water or vegetable broth.
- 7. Bring to a boil and simmer for 20-25 minutes.
- 8. The stew is ready to eat when it's thick and bubbly!


