HOW DO I MAKE AN APPOINTMENT?

STEP 1: MAKE AN ACCOUNT

Make an account at uncc.mywconline.com using your @uncc.edu or @charlotte.edu email address.

STEP 2: BROWSE AVAILABLE TUTORS

Hover over the names of available tutors to read their conferencing options. The UNC Charlotte Writing Resources Center offers tutors who specialize in a variety of disciplines. There is always someone who can help!

STEP 3: PICK AN APPOINTMENT TIME

Choose from a variety of appointment times on the grid and fill out the intake form. The UNC Charlotte Writing Resources Center offers both day and nighttime hours to accommodate all schedules, as well as several conferencing options. These conferencing options include **in-person**, **zoom**, and **eTutoring**.

MORE ON CONFERENCING OPTIONS

IN-PERSON CONSULTATIONS

You can meet with tutors face-to-face in **Cameron 125** and **Atkins G34**. Bring a copy of your paper and the description of its associated assignment for the tutor to review. You will be able to discuss the strengths of your paper, generate ideas, and locate areas for clarification and/or improvement in your writing.

ZOOM

Zoom appointments are digital versions of face-to-face appointments through synchronous video chat. If you choose a Zoom appointment, you will need to visit the **WRC Zoom Room** at **uncc.zoom.us/my/wrchelp** at the time of your appointment. Make sure to be online with video and audio available at that time.


eTUTORING

eTutoring appointments are asynchronous. You can **upload your paper to your appointment intake form**. During the hour of your appointment, a tutor will offer marginal comments on your paper. Then, at the conclusion of your hour, watch your email for a notification that your appointment has been modified or that a tutor has responded to your paper. You will then be able to download a version of your paper with the tutor's marginal comments.

*eTutoring is an appropriate option when a piece of writing is in the final stages of the writing process and a full draft is complete. Comments are made through Microsoft Word.

WHAT CAN TUTORS DO?

WRC MISSION STATEMENT

The Writing Resources Center (WRC) offers one-to-one writing support for writers in any discipline and of all skill levels. Our highly trained writing consultants provide resources and tools Niners need to confidently develop their writing voice. The WRC celebrates the linguistic diversity of our students, faculty, and staff. We acknowledge that Standard American English (SAE) is only one way to speak and write. Our consultants help writers navigate SAE in their academic and professional writing, while also supporting writers' own languages, dialects, style, and voice. We strive to make the WRC a welcoming community for writers to practice new skills, talk through writing problems, make mistakes, collaborate with peers, and gain confidence in their writing abilities. Our space and our tutoring methods are inclusive to diverse identities (race, ethnicity, gender, sexuality, neurodiversity, ability, language, discipline, nationality, age).

LIMITATIONS ON APPOINTMENTS

- Walk-ins must register at **uncc.mywconline.com** and schedule an appointment.
- Clients may walk-in until 35 minutes past the hour. After that, they must wait until the next hour to try again.
- A client is limited to one appointment per day. This includes scheduled appointments and walk-ins.
- A client may schedule a maximum of three appointments per week, which applies collectively to all WRC locations.
- A client who has scheduled three appointments in a week may walk-in for one additional walk-in appointment.
- Due to high demand, a client may not book more than 2 sessions per week with Chris, the WRC's Senior Tutor. Clients may book an additional appointment with any other tutor.
- A client who has recorded two no-shows receives walk-in only status for the remainder of the semester.

SIGN UP FOR RESEARCH THEORY & PRACTICE IN TUTORING WRITING

WRDS 4402 / ENGL 4400 / ENGL 5400

Tuesday/Thursday 2:30-3:45pm

All tutors at the WRC—both novice and experienced—must complete WRDS 4402/ENGL 4400/5400: Theory & Practice of Tutoring Writing (same course meeting). In this course, students **read and write about writing center scholarship**, **discuss tutoring practices**, and **conduct writing center research**. Students in the course will also tutor for three hours a week in the WRC.

After successful completion of the course, and with the permission of the director, students can go on to become a paid tutor within the WRC. We currently pay **\$12/hr**. Continued employment in the WRC requires ongoing professional development via staff meetings. Experienced tutors may also apply for a small number of summer tutoring positions.

If you are interested in applying to join the 2024 class, please send a writing sample and letter of interest to **wrcadmin@uncc.edu**. Your letter of interest should be 3-5 paragraphs long and address the following:

- Why you are interested in learning more about writing and tutoring practices.
- What you already know about the WRC and what specifically about the Center interests you.
- Why you are interested in working one-on-one with UNC Charlotte's writers.
- Any relevant experience you have (not a requirement for the job).

BLACK HISTORY MONTH

FROM "AGENTS OF CHANGE: AFRICAN AMERICAN CONTRIBUTIONS TO WRITING CENTERS"

BESS BOLDEN "B.B." WALCOTT

Bess Bolden "B.B." Walcott is credited as likely the very first Black writing laboratory director. She attended Tuskegee University, a historically Black college (HBCU), and later became Tuskegee's director of public relations and an instructor of composition. Walcott was an important figure in black feminism who worked extensively with the Tuskegee Women's Club. Her work combined trade programs with writing instruction to assist Black students in obtaining employment. These are only a few of her many accomplishments!



DR. CORAGREENE JOHNSTONE

Dr. Coragreene Johnstone started the Remedial Clinics at Bennett College in Greensboro, North Carolina, an all-women's HBCU. The Remedial Clinics provided workshops in writing, reading, speaking, and math. These workshops are agreed by scholars to have prefigured contemporary writing centers: "visits were voluntary, writing projects from any class were welcome, and the mode of instruction was individual conferences" (Mendelsohn and Walker 26).



HUGH GLOSTER

Hugh Gloster founded the Association of Teachers of English in Negro Colleges (ATENC), which is now referred to as the College Language Association (CLA). The ATENC held annual conferences to address the concerns of HBCU English and modern language faculty. The goal of the ATENC was to examine the needs of students of color, whose difficulties were often left unaddressed by the National Council of Teachers of English and the Modern Language Association.

SWCA CONFERENCE 2024

ON FEBRUARY 22, 2024,

UNC Charlotte Writing Resources Center Director Dr. Katie Garahan, Associate Director Dr. Jan Rieman, and tutors Maya Osaka and Bree Johnson presented their research at the 2024 Southwestern Writing Center Association (SWCA) Conference in Atlanta, GA!

Dr. Katie Garahan and **Dr. Jan Rieman** focused their presentations on the exciting task of cultivating a culture of undergraduate research in a University Writing Center. They explained their strategy of supporting undergraduate practitioner-researchers during their semester-long Research, Theory, and Practice of Tutoring Writing course and mentoring them in the research process as they tutor in the writing center.

Maya Osaka presented their study titled "Disability & Design in the Writing Center," which focused on neurodiversity and the physical and structural design of Writing Centers. Maya explored the ways that disability and accessibility are conceptualized in Writing Centers from the perspective of tutors and directors, and placed emphasis on the lack of research done surrounding accessibility in Writing Center design.

Bree Johnson shared their project titled "Creating an Emotionally Mindful Writing Center." Bree proposed a program by which tutors could be trained on emotional mindfulness practices adapted from Driscoll and Wells' "Tutoring the Whole Person: Supporting Emotional Development in Writers and Tutors". We are so proud of our directors and tutors. Fantastic work, guys!

WRC staff asked tutors who identify as women to talk about their experiences in working at the Writing Center, and to address how their identity as a woman shapes their tutoring experiences and writing.




"Before I am a writer, I am a woman whose experiences are shaped by the fact that I am seen as a woman. What I put in poetry is informed by my distinct experience as a woman. I am never divorced from my womanhood, ever."

"Sometimes, I think people come into the Writing Center expecting for me to be a man. When I'm not, it throws people off. I try to show that, though I am tutoring in a male-dominated field, I still have something of value to offer."



"Most people don't ever intend to be sexist; however, there can be moments where, in a paper, someone might write something on accident. Having to be the one to correct those things can get a little awkward."



"I love that we create space. I love that we are willing to understand complete strangers and create a comfortable environment for them. I love that we have such a strong willingness to connect and to adapt."



Midas is published **every fall** and **spring semester** and is available across campus!



Zauren Allen's CLASSIC PEACH COBBLER

A great treat to give writers fuel!

INGREDIENTS

- 1 quart jar peaches
- 6 tablespoons butter
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup milk
- Ground cinnamon



PREPARATION

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°.
- 2. Slice butter into pieces and add to a 9x13 inch baking dish. Place the pan in the oven while it preheats to allow the butter to melt. Once it is melted, remove the pan from the oven.
- 3. In a large bowl, mix together the flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt. Stir in the milk, just until combined. Pour the mixture into the pan, over the melted butter, and smooth it into an even layer.
- 4. Spoon the peaches and juice from the jar over the batter. Sprinkle cinnamon generously over the top.
- 5. Bake at 350° for about 38-40 minutes. Serve warm with a scoop of ice cream, if desired.
